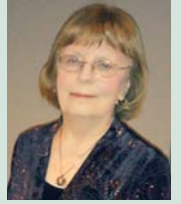
Jordan Taylor

In 1966 she and Tony moved to Fitchburg and had their youngest child, Gina. In 1957 Phyllis returned to the workforce with the Wisconsin Corrections Camp System where she worked for 27 years before retiring in 1987.

In 2001, her daughter Gina was crowned Festa Queen, and last year her granddaughter **Angela Masino** was Festa Queen. ■■

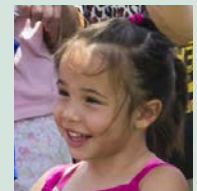
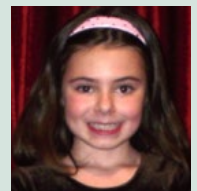


Festa Queen and Little Miss Festas
