# Amichevole Novita (friendly news)

Long ago, and not too far away on E. Gorham Street, my cousin, **Joe Tripalin**, was born. The date was September 21, 1948, which meant that I was 11 going on 12, and would sometimes babysit. His father, my Uncle Joe, was my father's younger brother, both of whom grew up in the Greenbush. It gives me the greatest familial pleasure to feature him here as an 18+-year member. He is also a UW Business School graduate with bachelor and master degrees who retired from CUNA as a vice-president to start his own company. He celebrates life with his lovely wife, Deb, three children, Sara, Kate, and Mike, and three grandchildren, Logan, Karson, and Andi. He is also deeply loved by me.

Joe's fond memories include attending festa-like picnics with his dad back at Olin Park, allowing them to immerse themselves in Italian culture with Greenbush friends. Stories were shared with us about our grandparents, Salvatore and Caterina Tripolino who migrated from Palermo, Sicily, to settle in Greenbush on Gwinette Court in 1911.

When Joe spent time with his dad's friends, stories were shared about going to "farmer" dances outside of

town back in the 1930s. His father was a little guy and a terrific dancer who had great times dancing with the farm girls. This infuriated the farm boys who weren't able to dance as well as the guys from Greenbush and fights would occur. Although the Italian boys always won, many sported black eyes on Sunday mornings while Joe "Trip" always managed to escape without a scratch.

Other humorous and fond memories were the trips Joe and his dad took together when going to the "Bush" for spaghetti dinners, which meant entering through the back doors of Tony Urso's restaurant on W. Washington Avenue where heavy kettles of spaghetti sauce simmered for hours. Once, when the ladies in the kitchen learned of little Joe's bad cold, they fashioned a necklace of garlic cloves to prevent it from getting any worse. Joe can't remember if it helped, but does remember that people stayed away from him.

Joe's dad had a tavern called the Trip-a-lin near Oscar Mayer. A lot of time was spent there to be together. Many Italian friends who stopped by spoke Sicilian about the Greenbush. When Joe asked his dad to teach him the language he had learned as a child, after spending a year in Sicily with his mother while visiting her parents Giuseppe and Rosalia DiMaio, his father would claim that he couldn't remember enough to pass on.

When Joe witnessed the razing of the old "Bush," it became a turning point in his life.

With wonderful memories of sharing time there with his father, he wonders what the community might have become had the city allowed it to change generically instead of going through urban renewal.

Today, in his own way, my cousin, Joe, as a proud IWC member, does what is necessary to maintain the glory and charm of the Italian culture and heritage in a city that once held the old and misunderstood Greenbush neighborhood in the palm of its hand.

### Grounds


